

OPTIONS FOR ENHANCING YOUR NECK LINE

Cosmetic deformities of the neck come in many forms. A "double chin" makes one look heavier and older. Loose skin of the neck is one of the earliest signs of aging. We have many ways to help you improve the appearance of your neck. Non-operative treatments include Kybella to reduce small areas of fat deposition and the use of Neurotoxins (Botox or Dysport) for bands of the neck.

Patients with greater degrees of fat or fullness in their neck often do well with liposuction. Liposuction can be done under local anesthesia and oral sedation. Those individuals with loose skin may benefit from a "Necklift" or a "Facelift", depending on the degree of excess skin present.

TREATMENT OF BREAST "LUMPECTOMY" DEFORMITY

October is Breast Cancer Awareness month. We want to offer our prayers and best wishes to all of our patients and their family that continue their path towards survival. We often talk about the patients that we have helped with total breast reconstruction after Mastectomy, but we rarely talk about the treatment of our patients that have chosen to have a lumpectomy and radiation therapy. Fortunately, most of these patients do not need our help. Occasionally, a patient whom has had treatment with lumpectomy will have significant size asymmetry because of the amount of tissue removed from one breast or they may be left with an indent in their breast from the collapse of tissue from the resection.

Patients with asymmetry can be treated with asymmetrical augmentation or breast lift/partial reduction to obtain size and shape symmetry. Indents can be treated with the replacement of volume with fat grafting, implants, or vascularized soft tissue. If your loved one is concerned about asymmetry or post lumpectomy deformity - call 912-355-8000 to ask for an evaluation by any of our reconstructive surgeons.

MELANOMA

This is what we refer to as the ABCD's.

Asymmetry: one half doesn't look like the other half

Border irregularity: The edges of the pigment look jagged instead of smooth

Color variation: There are different shades of brown pigment

Diameter: increasing in size or larger than a pencil eraser

The presence of any of these findings does not mean that you have a melanoma, but rather that you should have the lesion evaluated. Whether you see your primary physician, a dermatologist or one of our Plastic surgeons a biopsy will be performed to determine if the lesion is benign or malignant.
